

How Can We Help MMIW? FROM WE R NATIVE RESOURCE GUIDES:

There are a few ways to get involved as an MMIW advocate. Here are some tips to get started in your community:

Tip 1 – Education

We each have more to learn about the MMIW movement. For example, did you know that some people chose not to use MMIW, because they believe it is not inclusive enough? Some people use other terms, such as: MMIWG = Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls, MMIR = Missing and Murdered Indigenous Relatives, MMIP = Missing and Murdered Indigenous People. The Indigenous people who are too young to be considered adults and those who identify as men, Two-Spirit, trans, or non-binary are also affected by high rates of disappearances and murders. Each of the terms above focuses on raising awareness for Indigenous people (more broadly than just women) who are impacted by violence.

Take some time to learn more about MMIW, MMIWG, MMIP, and MMIR. Here are a few places to start:

Tip 2 – Use your voice

Each of our voices carries magnificent power. By sharing stories, pictures, videos, and other things with each other, we can help keep the MMIW movement going strong. Speak to your friends and trusted adults, and consider using social media as an outlet to remember MMIW to keep the movement going. Sometimes, people use hashtags (#MMIW, #MMIP, #MMIWG, #MMIR) to be able to quickly find other stories and see how many people are involved.

Tip 3 – Support, not shame

Remember that no one life is more or less valuable than any other. Evaluating our own personal lives, questioning our own internal biases or judgements about others is important. MMIP affects everyone – regardless of their place of living, work, free time activities, or health status. Those MMIP who engage in **substance misuse**, stigmatized sexual activities, or are houseless deserve just as much shame-free and stigma-free support than MMIP who do not engage in those behaviors.

Tip 4 – Practice self-care

Many of us are impacted by MMIW and MMIP. <u>Taking care of yourself</u>, leaving room for grief, and identifying good coping skills to <u>manage your mental health</u> while engaging in MMIW advocacy is key to continuing the movement.

Get Help If it is safe to do so, speak with a trusted adult. School counselors, nurses, teachers, principals, Tribal leaders, or other trusted adults are there to help guide and support anyone in need.

- Sometimes things are too overwhelming to deal with alone. If you need free advice from a trained counselor, simply text the word"NATIVE" to 741741.
- StrongHearts Native Helpline: 1-844-7NATIVE (), you can connect anonymously with a Native advocate.
- The <u>National Indigenous Women's Resource Center</u> and the <u>Coalition to Stop Violence Against</u> Native Women fight for safety and sovereignty for Native women.

"Under Oregon law, public schools "may not prohibit a student from wearing Native American items of cultural significance at a public-school event." Items of "cultural significance" are defined by the statute as "items or objects that are traditionally associated with a Native American or that have religious or cultural significance to a Native American." The statute further defines a "public school event" to include "a graduation ceremony, an award ceremony, a public meeting or any other public event held or sponsored by a school district."

RE: Tribal Regalia at Public School Ceremonies

As we begin preparing for graduation this year, I am pleased to share the passage of House Bill 2052 regarding Tribal Regalia. This bill became effective upon passage and is now law in Oregon. This law recognizes the inherent right of tribal sovereignty wherein American Indian /Alaska Native students can wear their tribal regalia or items of cultural significance at graduation and other public school ceremonies.

High school graduation is a time of excitement and a time to honor the accomplishment of students, families, and our communities. The passing of the Tribal Regalia bill extends this celebration by honoring the hard work and achievements of our American Indian / Alaska Native students, honoring culturally inclusive ceremonies, and reflecting and acknowledging the diversity of our students and families.

The Oregon Department of Education is committed to fostering district government-to-government relationships with the nine federally recognized tribes in Oregon. We have heard from tribal partners and other American Indian students and families how meaningful it is to wear cultural items during graduation ceremonies as a means of honoring their tribe, their community, and their heritage.

The Oregon Department of Education fully supports students who would like to outwardly wear items honoring their unique Native American cultures. This law provides opportunities for American Indian / Alaska Native students to honor their heritage by wearing items of cultural significance such as eagle feathers, cedar, beaded caps, tribal insignias, and stoles during graduation ceremonies. As districts begin implementing the Tribal Regalia Law this spring, I encourage you to review current policies which may conflict with the passing of HB 2052; in the event a conflict exists, important policy changes should and must occur.

The Oregon Department of Education appreciates all you do to support educational equity in our state and to create a school environment that is culturally honoring and inclusive of our diverse students and communities.




